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A REFUTATION: Live Dramatic Readings and Open Public Discussions in Washington, DC, Exploring Health Inequities Today and in 1793

<u>Theater of War Productions</u> will present a timely performance of 18th century texts with actors Chad Coleman, Brían F. O'Byrne, Michael Potts, and Peter Marks.

February 3, 2025 — Dramatic readings by acclaimed actors from conflicting historical accounts of Philadelphia's 1793 yellow fever epidemic will spark a guided audience discussion on America's current health inequities, in *A REFUTATION*, with two performances in February in Washington, DC.

Theater of War Productions' <u>Bryan Doerries</u> directs, adapts, and facilitates *A REFUTATION*, with funding support from <u>The Greenwall Foundation</u> as part of its 75th anniversary celebration. Two DC institutions – <u>DC Public Library</u> and <u>Ebenezer United Methodist Church-Capitol Hill</u> are providing performance spaces and serving as community partners for this theatrical event.

The primary text for the readings comes from a pamphlet by Absalom Jones and Richard Allen, two prominent Black religious and civic leaders in Philadelphia, describing the Black community's suffering and loss during the epidemic. It was written to rebut a popular, short history of the epidemic written by Irish American publisher Matthew Carey that perpetuated racist tropes and falsely asserted that Black nurses and other caregivers swindled and abused their white patients. Actors for *A REFUTATION* include <u>Chad Coleman</u> (*The Walking Dead, The Wire*), <u>Brían F. O'Byrne</u> (*Conclave, Million Dollar Baby*), <u>Michael Potts</u> (*The Wire, The Piano Lesson*), and <u>Peter Marks</u> (former chief theater critic for The Washington Post).

By presenting interwoven selections from both pamphlets as a dramatic oratorical debate featuring acclaimed actors, *A REFUTATION* will catalyze powerful guided audience discussions about health inequities in America framed by the perspectives of current nurses, EMTs and paramedics, health aides, frontline workers, and first responders with lived experience.
